



One Happy Camper Retention & Scholarship Study May 2012

This presents findings from the One Happy Camper (OHC) Retention Study, fielded among 2009 and 2010 OHC recipient families between March 26 and April 12, 2012. Response rates of 28% and 35%, respectively, yielded large, representative samples of 847 families for 2009 and 1,870 families for 2010. The research was conducted by Summation Research Group, Inc., as an outside, independent research organization.

The results are overwhelmingly favorable, showing return rates in the summer following the first-year incentive <u>exceeding 80%</u> for both years. Moreover, the *net* retention after <u>two</u> summers, (i.e., those 2009 families returning in 2010 and *again* in 2011) was 70%.

KEY FINDINGS:

- 1) Do OHC incentive recipients return to camp? YES
 - The vast majority (82%) of OHC recipient families return to camp for a second summer. (Exhibits 1, 2)
 - Retention actually grows for the third year. Almost 90% of the 2009 recipients who returned in 2010 went on to a *third* summer in 2011. (Exhibits 3, 4)
- 2) Does the 2nd Year OHC incentive grant impact retention? NO
 - The availability of 2nd Year OHC incentives appear to have no significant impact on retention. Where 2nd year incentives are available, retention is <u>virtually identical</u> to areas where it is not. (Exhibit 5)

- 3) Do OHC incentive recipients request/need more scholarship? NO
 - OHC incentive recipients receive scholarship at the same rate as other campers. Of those returning for a second summer, 43% received outside funding support. (It should be noted that this figure includes both those campers who received an OHC 2nd year incentive grants and those who did not).
 - While it is not possible to fully understand the impact the 2nd year grant had on scholarship requests, it is worth noting that among 2009 recipients returning for a *third* summer in 2011 when no incentive was available, scholarships <u>declined</u> to 31%. (Exhibits 6, 7)

- While this means that OHC is introducing families who are paying for camp themselves, those still seeking support turn increasingly to the camps and local temples/synagogues. (Exhibit 5)
- For some, cost continues to be an issue. Consistent with other research, affordability was the reason mentioned most often for not returning to camp. This was true, even when comparing areas with and without 2nd year OHC grants. In <u>both</u> cases, about a third of non-returners cited affordability as an issue. (Exhibits 5, 8)

Exhibit 1 One Year Later: 2009 OHC Recipients In The Summer of 2010






Exhibit 3 2009 Recipients Who Returned in 2010 and Again in 2011







