Haiku Problem Solving: Noah

SUMMARY:	Staff will use haiku writing to practice solving problems in a concise manner
TOPIC(S):	Problem solving, intentional thinking
LEARNING OBJECTIVE:	To encourage, and give staff experience, using concise ways to solve problems
AUDIENCE:	Counselors, CITs
TIMING:	15-20 minutes, a few weeks into the summer
APPENDICES:	Noah's Ark Text
MATERIALS NEEDED:	Pens & paper
SET-UP DETAILS:	Room with enough space for group to spread out. Comfortable space if possible

Opening & Context (5 minutes)

Share the story of Noah's Ark (full text is available below to read or reference for anyone who wants it).

Connect the story of Noah and problems that already have, or might, arise at camp. At camp, sometimes problems can seem enormous and complicated, but sometimes simplifying them helps to gain some perspective and find a simple solution.

Introduce the format of haiku (3 line poem with a specific syllable set: 5 syllables on the first line, 7 syllables on the second line, 5 syllables on the third line)

Share the Haiku:
A flood was coming
no, no said the animals
pairs boarded the ark

Before splitting up into smaller groups note that the haiku is not just a rehashing of the problem, but names the problem and simply states a solution. The haiku here shows (in line 1) the problem, (in line two) the reaction, and (in line 3) the solution.

Haiku Writing (7 minutes)

Break into small groups (2 or 3) and take one minute to decide on a problem they want to address (if you are concerned that they might not have one to address, you can do a group sourcing before breaking up into groups).

Ask groups to take the next 5 minutes to write their own haiku(s) addressing the problem and using the following methodology:

- Simplify the problem
- Name the impact or reaction
- Suggest a solution

Note, your groups may find that they need to write a series of haikus (one haiku for problem, one for impact/reaction, one for solution) or they might find that the any one part doesn't fit nicely on one line. That's ok! Try to keep them short and sweet, and definitely stick with the 5/7/5 syllable breakdown for each line.

Haiku Sharing & Debrief (5 minutes)

Give each group a chance to share their haikus - ideally they should need little to no explanation.

Debrief Highlights:

- -What did you realize/notice when you had to boil the problem down?
- -How can you remember/help each other remember to take a step back, analyze, and simplify throughout the summer?
